Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Fidelity Emerging Markets Debt Multi-Asset Base Fund (Fund) aims to provide a steady flow of income and the potential for capital gains. The Fund invests primarily in fixed income securities of issuers in emerging market countries.

Strategies: The Fund's assets are allocated among issuers in different emerging market countries, market sectors (such as corporate or government securities), industries as well as maturities based on the portfolio manager's view of the relative value of each country, sector, industry, or maturity. The Fund may invest in fixed income securities of any quality or term. When buying and selling fixed income securities, the portfolio manager analyzes the security's structural features, its current price compared to its estimated long-term value, and any short-term trading opportunities resulting from market inefficiencies. The portfolio manager may also consider the credit, currency and economic risks associated with the fixed income security and the country of the issuer. The Fund may invest in fixed income securities of issuers that are economically tied to emerging market countries, and in securities of non-emerging market countries. The Fund may invest in fixed income securities of any quality or term.

Risk

The risks associated with investing in this Fund remain as discussed in the prospectus. Any changes to the Fund over the period have not affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

The Fund is suitable for medium- to long-term investors who want to seek income and the potential for capital gains from their investment, and want to gain exposure to emerging market fixed income securities. The Fund is not an appropriate investment for investors with a short-term investment horizon. To invest in the Fund, investors should be willing to accept a medium level of risk. The suitability of the investment has not changed from what has been disclosed in the prospectus.

Results of Operations

Securities of this Fund are only available for purchase by other funds and accounts managed or advised by Fidelity, and are not available for public purchase.

Fidelity Emerging Markets Debt Multi-Asset Base Fund, Series O, returned 15.0%, for the one-year period ended March 31, 2024. During the review period, global bonds, as represented by the Bloomberg Global Aggregate Bond Index, returned 0.5% (in Canadian dollar terms).

Market overview:

Global investment-grade bonds, as broadly represented by the Bloomberg Global Aggregate Bond Index, returned 0.5% in Canadian dollar terms and 0.5% in U.S. dollar terms, for the one-year period ended March 31, 2024.

Global investment-grade bonds advanced modestly in Canadian and U.S. dollar terms over the period under review. Following historic global monetary tightening in some countries throughout 2022 and for most of 2023, investor sentiment shifted in the fourth quarter of 2023 to a view that policy rates had peaked, and policymakers may cut rates in 2024. This bolstered the global investment-grade and sovereign bonds market. Robust earnings, a slowing in the pace of inflation and resilient late-cycle expansion of the U.S. economy aided risk assets, including high-yield bonds which outperformed investment-grade bonds. Earlier in the review period, leading central banks in developed markets raised interest rates to combat rising inflation. Consequently, inflation declined at a steady pace across most of the developed world, falling from 5.0% in March 2023 to 3.2% in February 2024 in the U.S., and from 7.0% in April 2023 to 2.6% in February 2024 in Europe, prompting the U.S. Federal Reserve (the Fed) and European Central Bank (the ECB) officials to signal their willingness to lower interest rates. Elsewhere, the Bank of Japan remained an outlier and maintained its negative interest rate policy for most of the review period. However, it ended negative rates policy and enacted the first rate increase in 17-years, raising the interest rate from -0.1% to a target range of 0%-0.1% in March 2024. In contrast, the People's Bank of China reduced its benchmark lending rates and announced supportive policy measures to stimulate the economy which has experienced a prolonged real estate crisis, weak consumer spending and tumbling credit growth.

Factors affecting performance:

The Fund's benchmark, the J.P. Morgan Emerging Markets Bond Index Global Diversified Index, returned 11.3% for the review period.

The Fund outperformed its benchmark primarily due to investments in, and higher-than-benchmark exposure to, bonds issued by Ukraine. Investments in bonds issued by Venezuela and Brazil also contributed to relative returns. In contrast, investments in bonds issued by United States were the primary detractor from relative returns over the review period.

Portfolio changes:

During the review period, portfolio managers Nader Nazmi, Timothy Gill and Eric Lindenbaum continued to favour issuers they believed had sufficient stand-alone creditworthiness to pay their own debts, but remained cautious about fundamentally-impaired sovereign issuers. The Fund continued to allocate less than its benchmark to government and government-related bonds, as the portfolio managers believed that relative valuations for corporate bonds presented more attractive risk/reward opportunities.

The Fund increased its exposure to Hungary and Ukraine by the end of the period because of what the portfolio managers believed to be attractive relative value in those countries. Conversely, exposure to Qatar was decreased.

Recent Developments

Portfolio managers Nader Nazmi, Timothy Gill and Eric Lindenbaum note that the global economic backdrop exhibited signs of broadening stabilization in the first quarter of 2024. The portfolio managers note that although core U.S. inflation remained elevated, and investors dialed back their expectations for the magnitude of Federal Reserve rate cuts, investors remained largely optimistic that global monetary policymakers would soon shift to easing rates. Moreover, the portfolio managers note that central banks in emerging markets have continued to adjust monetary policy to near-term inflation trends more quickly than many other regions around the globe. Further global rate cuts could prove positive for emerging markets in the portfolio managers' view. The portfolio managers believe that while global monetary tightening appears to be over, the pace and magnitude of easing remains uncertain. Alternative scenarios to the soft-landing consensus include both upside inflation risk and the possibility of a greater-than-expected economic slowdown, in the portfolio managers' view. In addition, geopolitical risk remains elevated with the Russia—Ukraine and Israel—Hamas wars, U.S.—China relations, and economic uncertainty in a number of emerging markets, which the portfolio managers are monitoring closely.

Effective September 19, 2023, Anne Bell of Mississauga, Ontario, became a member of the Independent Review Committee (IRC).

Related Party Transactions

Manager and Portfolio Adviser

The Fund is managed by Fidelity Investments Canada ULC (Fidelity). Fidelity is part of a broader collection of companies collectively known as Fidelity Investments.

Fidelity provides or arranges for the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Fund in its day—to—day operations, bookkeeping, record—keeping and other administrative services for the Fund.

Fidelity is the portfolio adviser to the Fund and it provides investment advisory services to the Fund. Fidelity has entered into sub-advisory agreements with a number of entities including Fidelity Management & Research Company LLC, to provide investment advice with respect to all or a portion of the investments of the Fund. The sub-advisors arrange for acquisition and disposition of portfolio investments, including all necessary brokerage arrangements. The Fund is only offered in Series 0 securities and is only available to: (i) institutional investors who may be individuals or financial institutions who have been approved by Fidelity and have entered into Series 0 fund purchase agreements with Fidelity; or (ii) other funds and accounts managed or advised by Fidelity. The Fund does not pay management and advisory fees, or other operating expenses, other than certain specified fund costs, including taxes, brokerage commissions and interest charges.

Brokerage Commissions

The Fund may place a portion of its portfolio transactions with brokerage firms which are affiliates of Fidelity, provided it determines that these affiliates' trade execution abilities and costs are comparable to those of non—affiliated, qualified brokerage firms, on an execution—only basis. Commissions paid to brokerage firms that are affiliates of Fidelity Investments were \$0 for the period ended March 31, 2024. Fidelity receives standing instructions from the IRC in respect of policies and procedures governing best execution of transactions with affiliates, which includes brokers affiliated to Fidelity Investments, at least once per year.

Independent Review Committee, Cross-Trading and In specie Transactions

Independent Review Committee

Fidelity has established an independent review committee (IRC) that acts as an impartial and independent committee to review and provide recommendations or, if appropriate, approvals respecting conflict of interest matters referred to it by Fidelity. The IRC prepares, at least annually, a report of its activities for securityholders of the Fund. The report is available at www.fidelity.cg or at the securityholder's request at no cost by contacting Fidelity, using the contact information available on the final page of this document.

Cross-Trading and In specie Transactions

The Fund received the approval and standing instructions from the IRC in order to:

- (i) engage in cross-trading, which is a form of interfund trading. A cross-trade occurs when the Fund purchases or sells portfolio securities from or to another Fund, a U.S. fund or a separately managed account, through a broker;
- (ii) permit the Fund, in certain circumstances, to purchase and redeem Fund securities in consideration for securities rather than cash of another investment fund not governed by NI 81-102, or a separately managed account, managed by Fidelity.

For each of the transactions in (i) and (ii) above, the IRC's standing instructions require Fidelity to act in accordance with its associated policies and procedures and applicable law, and comply with the conditions in each of the exemptive relief orders received, which, in the case of cross-trading, requires additional periodic reporting to the Ontario Securities Commission. The standing instructions also require that investment decisions in respect of these transactions (a) are free from any influence by an entity related to Fidelity and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to Fidelity; (b) represent the business judgment of Fidelity uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; (c) comply with the applicable policies and procedures of Fidelity; and (d) achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund.


The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio adviser manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher the Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high portfolio turnover rate and the performance of the Fund. The portfolio turnover rate is calculated based on the lesser of purchases or sales of securities divided by the weighted average market value of portfolio securities owned by the Fund, excluding short-term securities. The portfolio turnover rate includes any proceeds from a short sale in the value of sales of securities and the cost of covering a short sale in the value of purchases of securities. For periods greater than six months, but less than a full fiscal year, the portfolio turnover rate is annualized. The portfolio turnover rate excludes any adjustment for in-kind transactions.

A discussion of Fund performance can be found in the Results of Operations section of this report. The Bloomberg Global Aggregate Bond Index covers the most liquid portion of the global investment grade fixed-rate bond market, including government, credit and collateralized securities. The EMBI (Emerging Markets Bond Index) is J.P. Morgan's index of dollar-denominated sovereign bonds issued by a selection of emerging market countries and is the most widely used and comprehensive emerging market sovereign debt benchmark. The J.P. Morgan Emerging Markets Bond Index Global Diversified Index limits the weights of those index countries with larger debt stocks by only including a specified portion of those countries eligible current face amounts of debt outstanding. On August 24, 2016, Bloomberg purchased the Barclays family of benchmark indices. As part of this transaction, all Barclays benchmark indices have been co-branded as the Bloomberg Barclays Indices for an initial period of five years. Effective August 24, 2021, the Bloomberg Barclays fixed income benchmark indices were rebranded as the Bloomberg Indices. This change occurred as planned at the end of the five-year period following Bloomberg's acquisition of Barclays Risk Analytics and Index Solutions (BRAIS) in August of 2016.
