Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

Securities of this Fund are only available for purchase by other funds and accounts managed or advised by Fidelity, and are not available for public purchase.

Fidelity Global Growth and Value Investment Trust, Series 0, returned 8.4%, for the six-month period ended September 30, 2024. During the review period, global equities, as represented by the MSCI All Country World Index, returned 9.5% (in Canadian dollar terms).

Market overview:

Global equities, as broadly measured by the MSCI All Country World Index, returned 9.5% in Canadian dollar terms and 9.7% in U.S. dollar terms, for the six-month period ended September 30, 2024.

Global equities rose during the review period. Steady growth in the U.S. economy along with expectations that declining inflation may support further rate cuts across most developed markets, supported investor confidence. Investor optimism in the artificial intelligence initially boosted gains in the information technology and communication services sectors but faced volatility in the latter part of the review period due to skepticism about stretched valuations. Defensive sectors such as utilities and consumer staples gained, as investors looked for stability amidst ongoing market volatility. Interest rate sensitive sectors, including real estate and financials sectors also rose, indicating optimism about enhanced earnings potential due to lower borrowing costs for consumers and businesses. In Europe, strong corporate earnings and decelerating inflation supported investor confidence. The European Central Bank reduced its benchmark interest rates by 25 basis points in June and September, bringing the rate down to 3.50%. Japanese equities experienced a period of volatility amid rising concerns about a recession in the U.S., an unexpected rise in Bank of Japan's benchmark rate of interest and the rise in the value of yen against the U.S. dollar. Emerging markets rose but lagged developed markets amid concerns about the outlook for China's economy, despite a modest recovery in growth and supportive policy measures announced by the People's Bank of China.

Factors affecting performance:

During the review period, the Fund's benchmark returned 8.3% for the period under review. The Fund's benchmark is a blend of 50% MSCI World Small Cap Index and 50% S&P 500 Index. The Fund outperformed its benchmark, primarily due to investments in the industrials sector. In this sector, an out-of-benchmark exposure to Japan-based general trading company Itochu, and an investment in Germany-based aerospace equipment company General Aerospace, contributed to relative returns. In this sector, investments in U.S.-based pharmaceutical company Universal Health Services, and an out-of-benchmark exposure to U.S.-based pharmaceutical company United Therapeutics, contributed to relative returns. In other sectors, investments in U.S.-based media and entertainment firm Meta, U.S.-based semiconductor company NVIDIA, and U.S.-based supermarket chain Sprouts Farmers Market, contributed to relative returns.

In contrast, investments in the consumer discretionary sector detracted from relative returns. In the sector, a lower-than-benchmark allocation to U.S.-based automotive and clean energy company Tesla, and an investment in U.S.-based clothing company PVH, detracted from relative returns. A lower-than-benchmark exposure to the real estate sector also detracted from relative returns. In this sector, a lower-than-benchmark exposure to U.S.-based investment trust Welltower, and an out-of-benchmark exposure to Philippines-based Robinsons Land, detracted from relative returns. In other sectors, an investment in U.S.-based technology hardware and equipment firm Apple, and an out-of-benchmark exposure to U.S.-based petroleum company Ovintiv. detracted from relative returns.

Portfolio changes:

During the review period, the Fund's exposure to the financials and real estate sectors was increased. In the financials sector, exposure was increased to U.S.-based full-service commercial bank East West Bank. In the real estate sector, the portfolio managers initiated a position in U.S.-based real estate investment trust Camden Property Trust, owing to what the portfolio managers believe to be attractive valuations and improving business fundamentals.

In contrast, exposure to the energy and materials sectors was decreased; the portfolio managers found what they believed to be better investment opportunities elsewhere. In the energy sector, the portfolio managers exited a position in U.S.-based oil and gas company ConocoPhillips. In the materials sector, the portfolio managers reduced exposure to U.S.-based building material manufacturer Eagle Materials.

At the end of the review period, the Fund had its largest absolute exposure to the information technology and financials sectors. The Fund diverged most from its benchmark's sector weightings by having more exposure to the communication services sector and less exposure to the real estate sector.

Recent Developments

The portfolio manager of the growth sub-portfolio, Will Danoff, has an investment strategy that focuses on identifying "best of breed" companies with strong long-term business models and competitive advantages that, the manager believes, can achieve sustainable long-term growth leadership. The portfolio manager remains positive on the earnings environment and has leveraged periods of market volatility to increase concentration in the Fund's active holdings. The portfolio manager continues to have a positive outlook on big tech-related companies that are profitable, grow at above-average rates, and operate in large and expanding markets, in the manager's view. The portfolio manager is finding strength in some of the more growth-oriented areas of the market across a wide variety of sectors, due to attractively valued earnings growth potential, investable secular trends and a potential peak in interest rates, in

the portfolio manager's view.

The portfolio managers of the value sub-portfolio, Sam Chamovitz, Morgen Peck and Salim Hart, employ an intrinsic-value investment framework, using bottom-up fundamental analysis and quantitative techniques to aim to identify high-quality companies that could compound returns over time. The portfolio managers seek to mitigate downside risk by emphasizing higher-quality companies with lower financial leverage, more consistent profitability, and what they believe are better management teams. They are seeking to take advantage of current market volatility by adding to some higher-quality names to the portfolio at what appear to be very attractive prices in their view.

Related Party Transactions

Manager and Portfolio Adviser

The Fund is managed by Fidelity Investments Canada ULC (Fidelity). Fidelity is part of a broader collection of companies collectively known as Fidelity Investments.

Fidelity provides or arranges for the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Fund in its day—to—day operations, bookkeeping, record—keeping and other administrative services for the Fund.

Fidelity is the portfolio adviser to the Fund and it provides investment advisory services to the Fund. Fidelity has entered into sub-advisory agreements with a number of entities including Fidelity Management & Research Company LLC, to provide investment advice with respect to all or a portion of the investments of the Fund. The sub-advisors arrange for acquisition and disposition of portfolio investments, including all necessary brokerage arrangements. The Fund is only offered in Series 0 securities and is only available to: (i) institutional investors who may be individuals or financial institutions who have been approved by Fidelity and have entered into Series 0 fund purchase agreements with Fidelity; or (ii) other funds and accounts managed or advised by Fidelity. The Fund does not pay management and advisory fees, or other operating expenses, other than certain specified fund costs, including taxes, brokerage commissions and interest charges.

Brokerage Commissions

The Fund may place a portion of its portfolio transactions with brokerage firms which are affiliates of Fidelity, provided it determines that these affiliates' trade execution abilities and costs are comparable to those of non—affiliated, qualified brokerage firms, on an execution—only basis. Commissions paid to brokerage firms that are affiliates of Fidelity Investments were \$7,000 for the period ended September 30, 2024. Fidelity receives standing instructions from the IRC in respect of policies and procedures governing best execution of transactions with affiliates, which includes brokers affiliated to Fidelity Investments, at least once per year.

Independent Review Committee, Cross-Trading and In specie Transactions

Independent Review Committee

Fidelity has established an independent review committee (IRC) that acts as an impartial and independent committee to review and provide recommendations or, if appropriate, approvals respecting conflict of interest matters referred to it by Fidelity. The IRC prepares, at least annually, a report of its activities for securityholders of the Fund. The report is available at www.fidelity.ca or at the securityholder's request at no cost by contacting Fidelity, using the contact information available on the final page of this document.

Cross-Trading and In specie Transactions

The Fund received the approval and standing instructions from the IRC in order to:

- (i) engage in cross-trading, which is a form of interfund trading. A cross-trade occurs when the Fund purchases or sells portfolio securities from or to another Fund, a U.S. fund or a separately managed account, through a broker;
- (ii) permit the Fund, in certain circumstances, to purchase and redeem Fund securities in consideration for securities rather than cash of another investment fund not governed by NI 81-102, or a separately managed account, managed by Fidelity.

For each of the transactions in (i) and (ii) above, the IRC's standing instructions require Fidelity to act in accordance with its associated policies and procedures and applicable law, and comply with the conditions in each of the exemptive relief orders received, which, in the case of cross-trading, requires additional periodic reporting to the Ontario Securities Commission. The standing instructions also require that investment decisions in respect of these transactions (a) are free from any influence by an entity related to Fidelity and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to Fidelity; (b) represent the business judgment of Fidelity uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; (c) comply with the applicable policies and procedures of Fidelity; and (d) achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund.

The trading expense ratio represents total commissions, other portfolio transaction costs and dividends and interest expense on securities sold short expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value during the period, including the Fund's pro-rata share of estimated trading costs incurred in any underlying investment fund, if applicable.


The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio adviser manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher the Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high portfolio turnover rate and the performance of the Fund. The portfolio turnover rate is calculated based on the lesser of purchases or sales of securities divided by the weighted average market value of portfolio securities owned by the Fund, excluding short-term securities. The portfolio turnover rate includes any proceeds from a short sale in the value of sales of securities and the cost of covering a short sale in the value of purchases of securities. For periods greater than six months, but less than a full fiscal year, the portfolio turnover rate is annualized. The portfolio turnover rate excludes any adjustment for in-kind transactions.
